Summer School in France for Primary Teachers

The Summer School will take place 28th July to 4th August and it is for primary school teachers teaching French. There will be 20 hours of French language lessons and 2 workshops focused on French phonics. The summer school is intended to help teachers upskill their proficiency in the language. The course will not cover pedagogy. The training fees, breakfast, dinner and accommodation in a French host family are covered by the Institut Français. Travel expenses to be paid by the participant.
